Residentially Based Programming Prepared by Kyle Wych February 5, 2016

- The information in this document provides information on the three types of programming done by the Residence Life Office.
 - In the spring of 2014, Residence Life determined RAs would no longer be required produce educational programs
 - These educational programs now fall under the "Take Too" programs. RAs must do two of these each semester.
 - o RA social programming was increased to 10 programs a semester for each RA
- The spreadsheet labeled "Community Programming by classification fall 2014-present"
 - Compares the number of programs each semester with the number of student contacts at the program for each grade classification. Residence Life is no longer tracking per area because the housing areas on campus are no longer building specific.
 - Example: South Halls now house freshman and sophomores. The old system of counting programs by area does not work since we have moved to grade classification programming not area programming.
- Overall programming for fall 2015, 208 programs attracted 2607 students in activities. This is an increase of 146 programs and an increase in overall attendance by 1697 students.
- The spreadsheet labeled "Community Programming by classification fall 2014-present":
 - o Lists classification area programming by Freshman, Sophomore, Apartments/Senior.
 - Shows unique programming done in housing areas such as Boo Bash, Dorm Wars (now Rec Fest), Oksoberfest and Mardi Gras.

Review:

- We evaluated every program done in Residence Life.
- o Implement General Education categories into the programming model. In progress

Next Year:

- Continue process of General Education programming model. What does this look like with the Barc Program?
- o Begin tracking unique IDs to see how many individual students attend programming versus repeat attenders of programming.

Fall of 2016:

- Attendance to programs varied depending on the type of program
- Movie Programs did not have student stick around for long. Other programs that were interactive retained students
- The most successful programs were video game tournaments, ping ping/pool tournaments, and DIY programs
- No significant drop-off in attendance with the extra programming
- There was not a significant change in attendance of programs when prizes and food when prizes and food were involved
- Females and male attendance at programs seemed to be even when it comes to attendance at programs
- Males attended more programs that were competitive
- Females attended more of the DIY programs
- Seniors/Junior were less likely to come to programs. When apartment RAs put on programs that were not in their areas,
 they received a higher attendance rate from residents in areas such as Centennial Hall.
- Focus on different programs that will target Seniors/Juniors in the Apartments.
- The most successful programs were video game and programs involving food
- There was not a significant change in attendance of programs when prizes and food were involved
- Attendance at programs decreased as the semester progressed
- Males/Female attendance changed depending on the programs. Males attended competitive programs such as tournaments and females attended more of the movie nights that were offered.
- Extremely high attendance overall
- Strong Take To attendance
- Largely varied program types
- Bit of a rushed start due to Charles's late arrival
- Lot of food related programs
- Take To's had next to no attendance
- Food was popular among the residents for Knutson and Seguin
- No video game or movie night programs (Trinity)

- Higher than usual numbers for Trinity
- Trinity's programming was more diverse in ideas than the rest of South Halls

- Market more efficiently throughout other areas

Conclusion and Analysis: Our percentage response rate was down 2% but we had 44 fewer students living on campus last year. Compared to spring 2015, we were down 53 students that actually participated in the survey. Naturally the overall percentages of strongly agree and agree were down from last year, however the mean were very consistent from last year and no true outliers could be found.

With looking at the data it shows that we are being consistent with the services that we are offering the students. However, we had more student mark strongly disagree in the *Living Environment* category versus last year. For an example for Q1: I have a positive living environment with people in my building: 50 students strongly disagree with that statement compared to 42 last year. Even with this comparison, we are still on top with student selecting agree or strongly agree to the survey questions.

Next year:

We will keep the survey on the portal because it will able us to capture as many students we can. However, it will be great to find a way to analyze the data without having to do it manually. We would also look into possibly offering supplemental questions that is catered to each community. This will help gain more feedback on what we are missing.
